
### Pre-Election Report





This year, voters will have the opportunity to head to the polls and cast a ballot impacting the course of governance in the Commonwealth. The election is the "Virginia Special" off-off year election. All 140 members of the General Assembly- 100 Delegates and 40 Senators- are the top of the ticket. When the 2024 Session gavels in, the General Assembly with have undergone the most significant transition in the past fifty years and most of this change occurred before a single vote has been cast. The Virginia Supreme Court drastically redrew the General Assembly maps and mass retirements lead to the loss of over 600 years of legislative experience. Additionally, over 60 freshmen have been sworn into since 2018. That significant turnover, combined with changes coming this year, will be a "Great Reset" for the legislature.

The natural question to be asked when election season is on the horizon is always the same- which party will be successful? First, a brief overview of recent elections. In 2017 Democrats made major advancements in the House, but remained in the minority. Following the 2019 elections, Democrats held their first trifecta since 1994. However, the pendulum of power swung back to the GOP in the 2021 Virginia Governor's election which saw Republicans swept the three statewide elections and regained control over the House of Delegates. This was a change in fortune for a party that had not won any statewide elections since 2009. Democrats now hold a slim majority in the Senate and Republicans have an equally slim majority in the House.



Above is a chart of the current chamber split and below is the current state of races. This report will highlight 22 races (13 house, 9 Senate) which are a mix of genuine toss-ups and some seats that lean in favor of either party that under certain conditions could be lost. Every caucus feels, rightly so, that there is a path to victory.





### **House Republican Path to Victory**

After two consecutive wave elections that overcame their peak 67-member majority, Republicans were able to bounce back, riding the coattails of Youngkin's "parents matter" focused campaign. The key to this election is the same as in recent years — the suburban voter. Chris Obenshain (HD41) and Geary Higgins (HD30) are the safest of the contestable races for the GOP.

Republicans must win in the Prince William based HD22 and three "Lean-R" Hampton Roads districts; two feature incumbent Delegates on the Peninsula, Delegate Batten (HD71) and A.C. Cordoza (HD86). The third race pits Baxter Ennis against School Board Member Karen Jenkins.

If Republicans win the races mentioned above, they must win four districts where Youngkin won by 51% or less. These districts include the following:

- HD 21: Based in Prince William and features former Board of Supervisor member John Stirrup (R) against veteran and Attorney Josh Thomas (D)
- HD 57: Largely based out of Henrico, HD57 overlaps with a critical Senate race. Homebuilder David Owen (R) is running against nurse Susanna Gibson (D)
- HD 65: Former one-term Delegate Josh Cole (D) faces Lee Peters, a member of law enforcement. HD65 is located in and around Fredericksburg.
- HD 82: Freshmen Delegate Kim Taylor (R) runs for reelection in a district Youngkin won by 50.62%. The district encompasses Petersburg and surrounding counties.
- HD 97: Freshmen Delegate Karen Greenhalgh (R) runs for reelection in a district Youngkin won by 50.6%. The district is solely in Virginia Beach.

Given recent news reports, House District 57 between David Owen and Susanna Gibson may shift closer to a "Lean R" seat. The race for the chamber could come down to two freshmen who narrowly won in 2021, Del. Kim Taylor and Del. Karen Greenhalgh. Delegate Taylor's race will test whether the Governor's focus and attention on Petersburg will pay dividends in a historically Democrat stronghold.

Republicans will be buoyed by the financial support of a Governor with record-level fundraising numbers. The last factor to weigh in a Republican victory is the success rate of the Governor's "Secure Your Vote Virginia" initiative. If Republicans can reduce their election-day vote deficit by encouraging early and absentee voting among their base, it will go a long way toward a victory for the GOP.

### **House Democrat Path to Victory**

After overcoming the GOP's dominant control over the House and electing the first female Speaker in the history of Virginia, House Democrats find themselves back in the minority and with a change in leadership. They should enter election day with 46 seats guaranteed.

Democrats must re-elect Delegate Willet and freshmen Delegate Clark. If they can secure these seats, Democrats will only need to win three of the five swing seats mentioned previously.

The suburbs of Northern Virginia will be the most telling for Democrats' chances of retaking the House. House District 21, given recent comments by Republican candidate John Stirrup, will be the battleground over the abortion issue. This is an issue that Democrats believe will help them win over suburban voters, especially college-educated women. House District 65 provides a perfect contrast between a former Delegate from the progressive wave elections in 2017/19 and a member of law enforcement heavily recruited by the Governor. If Democrats cannot win these two seats, their focus will shift to Republican freshmen Delegates Greenhalgh and Taylor, which are vital races to the GOP's hopes of maintaining control of the House.

### Senate Democrat Path to Victory

Senate Democrats have built their brand since Youngkin was elected "The Blue Wall". They should head into election day with 17 guaranteed seats and could reach 19. Senate District 22 is a rematch of the close special election held earlier this year between Senator Aaron Rouse (D) and Kevin Adams (R). Delegate Danica Roem is running for Senate District 30 against Bill Woolf (R), a political newcomer. These "Lean D" seats are required victories for the Democratic Caucus.

The most important race for Senate Democrats is SD16. The best Republican performance in this district in recent years was 47.6% by Attorney General candidate John Adams in 2017. Republican Senator Siobhan Dunnavant will likely overperform polling; the question is, will it be enough? Democrats must win this seat to maintain control of the Senate. If they can, Democrats will be one seat away from the majority.

With two wins in swing districts SD24 and SD31, Democrats would maintain their current caucus size at 22 seats. However, winning just one of these is all Democrats need to be in control of the chamber. Senate District 24, which stretches across the Peninsula, features incumbent Senator Monty Mason (D) against Danny Diggs, who served as Sheriff for over 20 years in York County and Poquoson. Sheriff Diggs will enter the race with more built-in name ID than most challengers. A victory for Monty is reliant on turnout in Newport News, which comprises 50% of the district. I discuss Senate District 31 below as it is a more critical seat for Republican chances at regaining control.

### Senate Republican Path to Victory

The most significant edge that Republicans have heading into election night is Lieutenant Governor Sears. Her role as presiding officer means that Republicans only need to win 20 seats to control the chamber. If they are successful, this could make her one of the most powerful Lieutenant Governors in the history of the Commonwealth. Republicans head into election day with 14 seats guaranteed. They should easily win contested races in SD4 and SD12, returning Senator David Suetterlein and former Senator Glen Sturtevant to the chamber. Success in these races put Republicans at 16.


There is a narrow but realistic path for Republicans to regain control. The route requires four additional electoral victories. The two races where they have the best opportunity are SD17 and SD27. Both races feature members of the House of Delegates who survived contested primaries. Senate District 17 is a race between Delegate Emily Brewer (R) and Delegate Clint Jenkins (D) in a district where Glenn Youngkin received just north of 52% of the vote. Senate District 27 has one-term Delegate Tara Durant (R) running against Joel Griffin (D) and a write-in campaign from her primary opponent. Both Trump and Youngkin were successful in this district, and Delegate Durant should be able to repeat their success. Winning these two seats would get Republicans to 18.

The most important race for Senate Republicans to win is SD 24. If Republicans can beat incumbent Senator Monty Mason, they will only need to secure one win in the remaining four elections. Their electoral victory could come via Senator Dunnavant retaining or upsets in either SD 22 (Rouse-Adams) or SD 30 (Roem-Woolf). The fourth option is a win in the open seat SD 31.

Senate District 31 is the most interesting in the state as it is a toss-up race and an open seat with two political newcomers in the race. Both have impressive backgrounds, but Republican candidate Juan Pablo Segura can self-fund his race more than any candidate. In the 2021 Governor's election, Youngkin received 50% of the vote. Former Governor Terry McAuliffe received 49.4%. Governor Youngkin's performance is the high water mark for Republicans in the district. Controversies in Loudoun County, which comprises nearly 90% of the district, have been a focal point of the Republican resurgence in Virginia. In 2023, it will again be at the center of politics in the Commonwealth.

### Youngkin vs Biden

In looking at the impact Governor Youngkin and President Biden could have on this race, the table to the right uses information from an August Roanoke College Poll to show that while the votes Youngkin and Biden received in their elections were similar in the Commonwealth, their approval ratings have gone in opposite directions. Youngkin held an approval rating of 51%, while Biden was 40%. Additionally, the Biden impeachment inquiry and the potential for a government shutdown could impact these races. Of course, local factors are unique to each race, which will drive voters' decisions. As we head through the fall toward election day, it is clear that both chambers are in play for each caucus.



Thank you for taking the time to read this pre-election report on essential races to watch this November. I will make a post-election report detailing who won and what it could mean for the 2024 General Assembly Session. I hope the information on the candidates and districts in pivotal elections is helpful. The data used to create this report was gathered from various sources, including the Virginia Department of Elections, candidate websites, and the non-profit Virginia Public Access Project (VPAP). Regarding VPAP, I would be remiss if I did thank their hardworking team for all they do to shed light on Virginia politics. They play a vital role in keeping all of us informed. 


Mr. Josh Thomas D)


Hon. Ian Lovejoy (R)






Del. Joshua Cole (D)


Del. Amanda Batten (R)




Del. Nadarius Clark (D)


Sen. David Suetterlein (R)


Sen. Siobhan Dunnavant (R)




Lt. Cdr Kevin Adams (Ret.) (R)


Sen. Monty Mason (D)


Del. Tara Durant (R)


Del. Danica Roem (D)
